Briercliffe Pubs and Brewing

How many public houses are there in Briercliffe?

It is not an easy question. It never has been. This is largely due to the changing location of the boundaries of both Briercliffe and Extwistle, but there are other issues which are not all that easy to resolve.

Just to add a bit of interest to the story of pubs and brewing in Briercliffe, you might be surprised to find out that these trades resulted a series of riots in Briercliffe in the late 1860's.

At the present time there are four public houses within the Parish. They are the Hare & Hounds, at Haggate; the Roggerham Gate, in that village; the Craven Heifer and the Commercial, both of which are in the Cop Row area. The

latter two were, until quite recently, in Burnley but the Cop Row area was taken

out of Burnley and included in Briercliffe about a quarter of a century ago.

We will come back to these pubs later in the

article but now let us turn our attention to brewing in Briercliffe. Many of you will know, that despite its name, the Worsthorne Brewery was at the Briercliffe Brewery which was located in part of Harle Syke Mill. Lots of local people erroneously call this mill, which is located on Burnley Road, in Briercliffe, "Oxford Mill" after a surgical dressings manufacturer which was located on the building. It is, however, important that this building is known by its proper name, Harle Syke Mill, because the village is named after the mill.

Until the early years of the nineteenth century most beer was produced at home. In Burnley there is still a pre-Industrial Revolution brewery in town. It is located at Towneley Hall and dates from the eighteenth century. It is almost 300 years old but it no longer brews beer. At present, the building houses Burnley's Local History Museum where you will find a number of exhibits from the Former Massey's Burnley Brewery.

In the early nineteenth century a number of independent breweries had been founded at Bridge End and on the banks of the river Brun, on Bridge Street, but most beer consumed in the town's pubs was made on the premises, usually not by men but by the women of the household. We know that some of Burnley's oldest inns brewed their own beer from as early as the sixteenth century. These included the Sparrow Hawk (formerly the Towneley Arms) and the Talbot (formerly the Parker's Arms). This family was the Parker's of Extwistle Hall, so they clearly had Briercliffe connections.

Getting back to Briercliffe and Extwistle, the first pub, in our area, that I know of that brewed its own ale is the Roggerham Gate. The reference refers to ale being brewed and sold in Roggerham in the Middle Ages though it is not clear that the site of the Roggerham Gate was the place where the ale was sold. The information can be found in the Manorial Records of the Manor of Iglenhill, of which the township of Extwistle was a part. We can infer, from this, that the Roggerham ale had been tested by the manorial ale taster and found wanting, something that would not happen at the Roggerham Gate today.

Other pubs, or inns, in Briercliffe, also brewed their own beer. It is known that the Hare & Hounds, in Haggate, founded before 1600, possibly 1585, brewed its own ale. A brewery, mentioned in an advert of 1830, existed behind the inn. This brewery was later used as the band room for Haggate Brass Band. The Sun Inn, a beer house, also in Haggate, was not built until the early 1850's, so it is unlikely that it ever brewed its own ale, but the Sportsman, on Robin House Lane, most definitely did, not only did it brew its own ale, it also distilled whiskey!

It was this property, which enjoyed the status of a beer house, that was responsible for riots of the late 1860's. This was a time when teetotalism was very prominent. The Baptist Minister, at Hill Lane, the Rev Richard Littlehales, took it on himself to convince local people that the Sportsman should be closed and, in doing so, he also succeeded in bringing to an end Mon John's, a beer house, at what is now Slack Farm, and the Thursden Inn.

It was not only alcohol that irritated Mr Littlehales, the Sportsman, was also used for gambling. Robin House Lane was a perfect pitch for road bowling and the site became famous for the illegal gambling that took place there. On occasion hundreds of men would turn up at this location, and others in, or near, Briercliffe – Widdop was one – and, until the police arrived, and stopped the event, it appeared that the consumption of vast quantities of ale, together with rampant gambling, let, as one man put it, "all hell loose".

The remains of the Thursden Inn can still be seen by Ridehalgh Lane (formerly Badger Lane), in Thursden. It was described as a "whist shop", a place which brewed its own small ale but, difficult to believe, there was another inn in the valley, the Rieve Edge Inn, which was located by the stream at the bottom of the Rieve Edge. Both of these inns can be dated to the eighteenth century, the Rieve Edge Inn became famous, in 1813, when a Luddite rioter, from Yorkshire, was arrested there.

Another hostelry could be found in Extwistle, on the old road from Roggerham, via Sweet Well to Widdop. It was known variously as the Oak Inn, the King's Arms and the King's Oak, though the first name is the most usual. Although it brewed its own ale, all that is left today is a tumble-down building at Wall Nook.

To round up the story of Briercliffe's inns and breweries, we should not exclude the Craven Heifer, a Massey House, & one of the best buildings in their portfolio of pubs. Both the Craven and the Commercial, now owned by Hyde's, are late nineteenth century pubs, but we should note that, before they were built, the Cop Row had two unnamed inns, one on the site of the Commercial, though I am not sure of the location of the other.

We should not forget the Briercliffe Working Men's Club, latterly a Social Club, the only drinking shop in Harle Syke. The village has had the reputation of being the largest place in England not to have a pub.

The other nearby pub, the Shooters, is still with us but it is in Nelson. The former pubs, at the Farmer's Arms, on the road to Trawden, and the Coldwell Inn, nearby, have long gone, as has the Traveller's Rest, at Widdop, which was only a few hundred yards outside Briercliffe, though the Packhorse, now closed, was further along the same road.

Not many of you will recall the Happy Cot, which was on Sutcliffe Street, in Harle Syke. Strictly it was a social club, but, as understand it, bottled beer was not an uncommon site in the club!





On the prom at Weston-Super-Mare




The land on which our Community Centre stands has recently been sold, and the library building has been demolished. To secure the Centre's future, the Parish Council has agreed a 25-year lease with the new owner. However, this comes at a substantially increased rent of £5,100 per year, alongside rising utility costs. To keep the Centre open and accessible, we've had to make some adjustments to charges. Our committee is focused on keeping fees as reasonable as possible so that local community groups can continue to use the space.

Christmas shortbread



Very easy to make, so perfect for the children or to give to friends and family as DIY foodie Christmas gifts.

What to do

- Beat together the sugar and butter in a large bowl until pale and fluffy.
- Stir in half the flour until combined then add the remaining flour and use your hands to bring it together.
- Add the orange and chocolate fillings and use your hands to bring the dough into a rough ball.
- Roll the dough into a fat sausage, roughly 5cm/2in in diameter. Wrap tightly in cling film and refrigerate for at least 1 hour or until solid.
- Preheat the oven to 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6 and line a baking tray with baking paper.
- Unwrap the cling film and slice the sausage into 14 rounds, roughly 2cm wide. Place onto the lined tray and cook for 15-20 minutes or until the edges are beginning to brown but the tops have no colour.
- Leave to cool slightly and enjoy. These will keep well for at least 1 week in a sealed container, but the fresher they are the better.

What you need

100g/3½oz caster sugar
200g/7oz butter, softened
300g/10½oz plain flour
50g/1¾oz chocolate
chopped into small pieces
½ orange, grated zest only



Recent Focus Areas:

- Anti-Social Behaviour:** Jody has been patrolling known hot-spot areas to deter ASB and is working proactively with young people to prevent problems from escalating.
- Speeding and Parking:** Following feedback from residents, targeted patrols have been carried out around local schools to address speeding and inconsiderate parking.
